
has really given us an opportunity to put our credentials before NAAC for assessment.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY & SWOC ANALYSIS

Criteria I: Curricular Aspects:

Assurance of Institutional quality through sustaining and enhancing educational standard is the thrust area of any institution of higher education. Nilkanthrao Shinde Science and Arts College Bhadrawati is previously affiliated to Rashtrasant Tukdoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur and since 2012-13 affiliated to the Gondwana University, Gadchiroli having clearly defined vision & mission. Our institution offers U.G. Programmes i.e. B.A. with 10 subjects, B. Sc. with 07 subjects, P.G. in Art faculty with 08, P.G. in Science faculty with 05 subjects, along with 5 Career Oriented Courses (COC) started with University Grants Commission (UGC) assistance under XIth plan in 2010.

Our College has introduced 01 new subject in U.G. 01, new subject in P.G. and 5 new COCs after our second accreditation in 2010. For effective curriculum delivery the college provides a strong support mechanism in the form of ICT, enriched library with wide database having OPAC Software. Invited talks, seminars, workshops, industrial visits and educational tours are regularly arranged as a part of our academic activities. The board of studies of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli revised and updated the syllabus recently and while revising the curriculum the latest development in the subject and the feedback received from all the stakeholder are implemented in which, our staff members actively played a crucial role. Semester pattern was introduced by Gondwana University in Science and Arts at U.G. and P.G. level in 2012-2013. Latest revision of the U.G. syllabus for semester Ist to VIth was done during the academic sessions 2012-13 to 2014-15 for which our institution played a crucial role of active participation.

Criteria II : Teaching – Learning and Evaluation

The prime objective of our institution of higher education is to cater to the educational needs of rural students belonging to different categories with different social and economic backgrounds of Bhadrawati and its peripheral regions. Publicity about the admissions is made through the college prospectus, college website and local news papers. Transparency in the admission process is ensured by strictly following the reservation policy of the government and the eligibility criteria for admissions as stated by the Gondwana university, Gadchiroli. The college takes regular review of the admission process and analyzes the students' profile every year so that admission process could be improved to ensure more access to admissions from diverse categories of students.

After identifying the students, the slow learners are provided extracoaching through remedial coaching classes. Advance learners are encouraged and guided to take part in seminars, quiz competitions and other events held outside the college from time to time. For better comprehension of the subject emphasis is given to laboratory experiments. Apart from this, field and industrial visits, workshops and seminars are organized for the students. The college provides facilities like a rich library, well equipped laboratories, internet, computers and other ICT tools which facilitate the learning to make it more students centric. To foster scientific temper and to nurture creativity and critical thinking the college organizes curricular, co-curricular activities and guest lectures by experts. The students are exposed to advanced level knowledge through guest lectures and interactions with eminent personalities. Many guest lecturers have been organized for the students during five years. The college runs coaching classes for various examinations. In order to maintain quality in teaching and learning, college plans teaching, learning and evaluation schedules and monitors the progress periodically. Efforts have been made to decrease the drop outs through counseling.

The college has 19 qualified and motivated experienced teaching staff of which 12 teachers are with doctoral degrees, 5 are NET/SET. The teachers are constantly striving for excellence by keeping abreast of the knowledge updates by attending national and international conferences, seminars, workshops, refresher and short term training courses from time to time. The college always encourages and gives complete support to the teachers for their efforts to achieve academic excellence

Being an affiliated college of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli evaluation of academic performance of the students is done by the college within the framework given by the parent university. For evaluation, teachers conduct unit tests, question-answer sessions, problem solving sessions etc. after the completion of each unit. Summative evaluation of the students' academic performance is carried out through seminars, college internal assessment and university theory and practical examinations. The students showing excellence in academics at college level are awarded with prizes and certificates sponsored by our teaching staff and management.

Criteria III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The college extends all possible help and encouragement to boost research activities in various Science departments by providing independent research laboratories with necessary instruments, library and internet facilities to the faculties and research scholars. Research is monitored by the principal as well as the IQAC and R & D cell of the college. The R & D Cell guides them to prepare and send research proposals to various funding agencies. This has resulted in receiving a grant of Rs 1105000/- from UGC for minor research projects. 07 projects have been successfully completed during post reaccreditation period and 02 newly sanctioned are ongoing during this period conferences, seminars, workshops, guest lecturers were organized to keep the research interest kindled. About 30 research papers were presented during papers conferences/seminars and 280 published national/international journals and proceedings of conference. We have publications in referred peer reviewed and indexed journals of national and international repute today. These publications have citations, impact factor, hindex and listed in international data base. The faculties also have written text books, edited and wrote chapters in text books of different subjects with ISBN no. There is 1 international patent in physics department of Dr. Kartik Shinde, Director R & D Cell of our college with South Korea.

The institution has 4 recognized research departments where Ph.D. Students are working for their research work in Botany, Zoology, Mathematics and Physics. In 15 different prioritized research areas, the work is being carried out by Ph.D. supervisors indicating the diversified lines of research in our institution. The college has planned to establish a Central Instrumentation Cell (CIC) to provide additional sophisticated research facilities with modern instruments to attract the faculties and students towards interdisciplinary, collaborative and high quality research in upcoming years. Some International and National collaborative links have been established by our departments for their research based activities. One student in the subject Mathematics has submitted his thesis to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.

The college has conducted a large number of extension activities in various categories like community development, environmental awareness, anti superstition, social work, blood donation, health & hygiene. These activities are carried out by all the departments including support from the NSS, NCC, Sports, Library and Study Centre for the benefit of students and the community at large throughout 5 years.

Criteria IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

Over the years, our college has developed adequate physical infrastructure to run the academic programmes efficiently in an area of 3.0 acres. The Master plan of the college campus indicates the existing building

and the proposed expansion. The college has developed. Infrastructure during the last five years (2010-15) and renovated the laboratories, office, classrooms and other facilities. Hostel facilities are made available for girls soon constructed with UGC XIth plan assistance. The construction of women's hostel was done from the UGC XIth plan grant of Rs 60, 00000.

The College has playground for volleyball, Kabbaddi, Kho-Kho, Basketball and other outdoor games. Also we have facilities for indoor games such as table tennis, badminton, chess, yoga, gymnasium, wrestling, power lifting etc. A well established gymnasium with modern instruments is also available for fitness.

The institution has 13 classrooms, UG, PG and research laboratories, an Auditorium, a Girl's Common Room, Library, IQAC Office. The college has learning resourses in the form of 54 computers including 4 laptops with internet facility, LCDs, OHPs, scanners, printers & smart boards. The department of English Language has established a language laboratory in order to help students to improve their communication skills. The budget allocation has adequately been utilized for maintenance and repair of infrastructure and laboratory equipments.

The library of the college has a procured 8050 books in 5 years span in which text books, reference books and subscribed journals on various subjects. The amount spent for procuring the books & journals during the last five years is Rs 4364902.

. The library is computerized. The students have an access through OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) the college has its own website www.nscollege.ac.in and has additional facilities for students such as canteen. The medical facilities are provided through our health centre located in college. As per need the special facilities are made available for differently-abled students. In addition to above, ornamental and medicinal plants garden, vermi compost unit and a pleasant atmosphere for learning process is provided to all.

Criteria V: Student Support and Progression

Our college publishes its updated prospectus every year at the beginning of academic session. Our enrolled students get scholarships and other financial assistance from the state and central governments. Also college provides Remedial coaching classes for students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections. The college encourages and develops entrepreneurial skills among the students through 15 career oriented value added add on courses sponsored by UGC, to us during XIth plan.

Our college conducts regular classes for competitive examinations in the campus. The college participates in games and sports introduced by university and provide all possible sports and games facilities to the students and to conduct University Level Sports and Games competitions. There are color coat holders in our college in the last five years. The college has organized Sports matches and students participated in events such as Youth festival and AVISHKAR. Academic counseling of students is carried out by the admission committee at the entry level. All the students of the college are addressed by the principal and are made aware of general discipline, rules and regulations to be observed. The college has a 'Student Grievance Redressed Cell' and 'Women Sexual Harassment Cell' which monitors sexual harassment of women at work place. In addition to these, an Anti-Ragging Committee has been constituted as per the state government and the university directives. Career and Counseling Cell made counseling and Placement Cell contact, the companies and arrange the campus placement camps for students. The institution is proud to have a Alumni Association comprising of a number of academicians, scientists, Advocates, and others as it members.

Students' progression rate in higher education from UG to PG is very low as per our college record. No of students were selected to represent our University in sports and games and in cultural events during Inter-University competitions. The college has 50 girls and boys NCC unit attach to Wardha. NCC cadets were selected for Republic Day Parade. In addition to that students represented the university in 'Avishkar'. The college has an NSS unit of 50 boys and girls. Along with its regular activities the NSS unit of the college conducts camps for Tree Plantation, Cleanliness Drive, Water Conservation, Blood Donation, Congress Grass Eradication and many more. The college encourages students to contribute their literature to our Annual college magazine "Shabdashilpa". Also Students bagged prizes in Debates and elocution. Every year, the student's Council is constituted as per section 40 (2) (b) of Maharashtra University Act 1994. Student members actively participate in various committees. With a view to spread the scientific temperament among the students, the college has organized lectures of the eminent personalities during the 5 year span. Our college magazine "Shabdashilpa" has bagged 3rd prize in contest organized by Gondwana University, Gadchiroli recently titled "Striyanwaril Attyachar".

Criteria VI - Governance, Leadership and Management:

The Vision and Mission statements of our college clearly reflect the distinctive characteristics of our institution. The executive members of the management, the principal and the faculty have a key role and active participation in LMC, IQAC, Purchase Committee, Library committee, and in the designing and implementing the quality policies from time to time. Monitoring and reviewing of academic and administrative processes is done

by them to strengthen the process of marching towards excellence. The college authority provides complete autonomy under the supervision of the Principal and heads of the department in planning and implementing the teaching—learning, research, extension work and student related academic co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Autonomy is given to the departments to utilize the budget allotted as per their need.

The college has a culture of participative management through decentralization of work through more than 42 college level committees, which help in grooming the leadership at various levels. The college has a perspective plan for teaching-learning, research, extension and co-curricular activities. Internal organizational structure and decision making process is achieved through LMC and IQAC where the quality improvement strategies are designed and action plan is decided. The college collects responses from students and stakeholders about the institutional performance on all the key aspects which is analyzed and implemented. The institution encourages and permits the faculty for participation in empowerment programmes and in the last five years, maximum faculty members attended refresher and orientation, short term courses whereas 2 faculty members availed travel grant of UGC to present papers abroad.

The performance appraisal every year is taken through API PBAS system for the teaching faculty. The financial budget is prepared and approved in LMC and regular financial audit is conducted by internal and external agencies and audited statement of receipt and expenditure is prepared by authorized C.A. The IQAC is fully functional, with members from the management, students, non teaching staff and alumni and involves all in designing and implementing the quality policies. The data collection and compilation on all academic activities is done regularly and accordingly and AQAR is prepared and submitted to NAAC.

Criteria VII - Innovations and Best Practices

The college campus is well maintained having a botanical garden with herb, shrubs and trees. Since its inception many initiatives are taken by the institution to make our campus eco friendly by adopting measures such as plantation of trees and waste management. Minimum use of electricity by shifting to the CFLs and other eco-friendly products with star rating in power saving. The college has Rainwater harvesting System in the premises. Plantation of saplings is regularly done in the vicinity of the campus. Bio diversity studies and eco-friendly activities, guest lectures on environmental issues are also organized Environmental Awareness Cell is formed in 2014-15 session to make students aware about environment and its growing problems.

The college has undertaken innovative activities, such as vermi compost production and waste minimization. Some of the other best practices of the institution include use of campus monitoring by CCTV cameras, departmental stock checking, UG and PG student subject societies in various subjects, Principal's address at the beginning for fresher's, meet and Morning Prayer, spreading the thoughts of social reformer Pt. Nehru for moral education through UGC sponsored Study Center, wildlife week celebration, Science Day activities, Fund raising for helping the flood victims of J & K, conduction of NSS camps in villages every year, Felicitation of meritorious students of our college.



- Employable skills: Students offering Computer Science are trained in the use of Computer software Tally, Photoshop, Auto-CAD etc. Department of Computer Science also conducts UGC-COC courses which are useful for the employment.
- **Better Career options:** Sessions on careers, making right choices in decision-making, choice of a career and more are conducted by the Placement Cell.
- Through these courses holistic development of students takes place.

1.3.5 Cite a few examples to enumerate the extent of the use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum.

Use of Feedback from Stakeholders in Enriching the Curriculum:

- 1. Feedback from Alumni: Feedback is obtained from the Alumni students during Alumni meetings. At the college level, new programmes and enrichment courses have been introduced as per Alumni students suggestions.
- 2. Feedback from Parents: Feedback is also elicited from the parents during PTA meetings. At the college level, new programmes and enrichment courses have been introduced as per parents suggestions.
- 3. Feedback from students: Feedback is obtained by the college teachers during revision lectures at the end of each semester.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

- The Principal and Co-ordinators of the respective courses monitor the quality of the enrichment programmes like Career Oriented Courses through planning and effective implementation. Each programme is evaluated through feedback obtained from students.
- The level of the students and their understanding is monitored through tests.
- Monitoring is done through college management, Principal and co-ordinator of the course.

1.4 Feedback System

• As our university is split from RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur to Gondwana University, Gadchiroli recently in 2012-13, the syllabus is newly framed of

Gondwana University, Gadchiroli, keeping in view the background of rural students. Our college had arranged workshops for the university affiliated college teachers about the scope of the syllabus which is newly framed for the Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.

- In the session, 2012-2013, department of Chemistry, Botany and Zoology had arranged workshops about the scope of the syllabus of semester system which is newly framed for the Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.
- In the session, 2013-2014, department of Mathematics and Physics had arranged workshops of semester system about the scope of the syllabus of semester system which is newly framed for the Gondwana University, Gadchiroli in which suggestions given by our teachers were incorporated.
- The college also runs 5 COC's, the curriculum of which is designed and developed by the college and the university approves it as per society needs.

- 4. After designing curriculum, university arranges a workshop on designed curriculum. Our faculty members participate in the workshop and communicate the required changes as per feedback to the Bord Of Study members of respective subjects of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli.

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Admission Process

i) Publicity of Admission Process

The institution has a marvelous history of about 23 years. With a large number of course combination to choose from, it has an exemplary reputation for higher education in Chandrapur district of Maharashtra State. Publicity for institution level courses is made through advertisements and press releases in local news papers and advertisements on local T.V.Channels. Information is also provided on the college web site to promote wide publicity.

The notification regarding admission contain detailed information about number of courses, eligibility, process of admission and academic as well as support facilities available in the institution. Prospectus gives a look into all the academic, administrative and financial aspects related to admission process which is made available to students in the month of June every year. The same information is also made available to students on college web site www.nscollege.ac.in. In addition to this, the faculty members of the college personally visited various schools of the neighboring areas to counsel students and motivate to join our institution of higher education.

ii) Transparency in Admission Process

The process of admission to various courses is carried out through the norms laid down by the Gondwana University and Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Maharashtra. The admission committee constituted for the purpose under the supervision of principal is entrusted with the task of assisting the entire admission process. The candidates are selected on the basis of first come first serve and admitted as per their choice. Students from all section of the society irrespective of cast, creed, class and gender are admitted thereby keeping to the objective of education for all. Online admission has been adopted for better transparency. This transparency is ensured from the stage of notification till the completion of entire admission process. Hence access, equity and social justice are ensured through transparency and adherence to rules. As soon as seats are full display boards are placed in the entrance from time to time with respect to various subjects.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the institution.

For UG & PG Courses:-

As per the directives of Gondwana University, Gadchiroli date of application forms/prospectus sale is notified on the notice board. Application forms can be purchased from college office and on the spot enquiries are attended to by Chairman of admission committee and his team of teachers of Admission committee. Selection of students to the course is based on marks obtained in qualifying examination (12th). The college admits the student's sole on the basis of merit in the qualifying examination. In case the affiliating university lays down a special criterion like entrance test or interview, the college strictly adheres to it. Both for UG and PG courses, the existing government/affiliating university policy of merit for admission is followed. Applications for admission to UG and PG courses are called for in the month of June. The counseling team/Admission committee helps the students to make choice of the medium of instruction and subjects. College follows reservation policy of the government also at the time of admission.

For Career Oriented Courses:

- Students admitted in the college for various UG courses are eligible for admission
- Depending on availability of seats, other institution students are also admitted.

The college offers three year under graduate and post graduate courses in science and arts. These admissions are done strictly according to the condition laid down by Gondwana University. Our mission being to provide the benefit of education to lesser privilege and marginalized sections (SC/ST/OBC/SBC/NT) , there is no cut off percentage for admission at the entry level as our institution caters to the need of poor students.

The admission committee takes precautionary measures while admitting students to the next higher class.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently- abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The Institution is fully adhering to government policies regarding the needs of differently-abled students. In the admission on process, though the number of differently-abled students is small, no discrimination is made but special efforts are made to admit them. The college makes this sure the classes of such students are held on ground floor only for their easy movement. During examinations also such students are provided with the help of teachers. These students are encouraged at every level in the institution.

As per Government norms, seats are reserved for differently abled students. The college implements schemes of Government of Maharashtra & UGC for their benefit.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes. The student is assessed at the time of admission on the basis of marks at entry level, by the admission committee. The subject teachers also assess the knowledge and skills of the students through interaction with them. It is expected that this analysis and the performance of students at qualifying examinations are likely to create a base for monitoring the future progress of students.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

- Through class room interaction and discussion with students, the teacher identifies slow learners (students having knowledge gap) initially. Such students are also identified on the basis of marks obtained in the internal examination.
- To bridge the knowledge gap, the teachers make the students to revise and recall their knowledge gained in previous classes. For this extra classes are conducted. Remedial coaching classes are also arranged for the weaker students.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

In our college, equal weightage is given to male and female students being coeducation institute different programmes are conducted by N.S.S. and N.C.C.
Units on same platform for male and female students. The practicals are also
commonly conducted. There are common facilities such as library, canteen,

auditorium and reading room etc. for male and female students. There is no differentiation in between male and female students and there is equal treatment given to them.

- College promotes inclusion by ensuring safe, respectful, and stimulating environment in the campus, which directly supports education and overall development of students.
- The college has various clubs & cells such as Zoological society Microbiological study club, Botanical society etc. Students Council, NSS, NCC which take up suitable activities for creating awareness among the students & staff
- Environment Awareness Cell helping to protect the environment.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The teacher identifies the advanced learners through their performance in previous examination and through interaction with them. The advanced learners are also identified on the basis of performance in internal and University examinations. Such active students are selected.

The institution adopts following strategies for facilitating advanced learners:

- Felicitation of meritorious students in Annual Social Gathering.
- By encouraging advanced learners to participate in various curricular and cocurricular activities; such as seminars, group discussions, quiz competitions, etc.
- Encourage them to enhance their communication skills, art of reading learning/and inculcate reading habit.
- By organizing interaction with alumni pursuing higher education as well as those holding higher positions.
- For advanced learners, extra coaching is provided.
- Counseling is given to the advanced learners regarding preparation for different examinations
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
 - After declaration of results by the University, results of every class and all subjects are analyzed. The students who are failed are advised to apply for supplementary examination. Counseling is done by the senior teachers.
 - Remedial classes are arranged for unsuccessful students to improve their performance, so as to minimize the drop- out rate. Every care is taken so that

he or she should not be thrown out of the stream. Such students are counseled and care is taken to improve their performance.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.).

Planning and Organization of Teaching, Learning and Evaluation:-

- Academic Calendar of College is planned every year by committee. While preparing the Academic Calendar, the committee takes into account, the academic calendar prepared by the Gondwana university. Academic Calendar of College is included in the college prospectus which is printed every year.
- ➤ The university specifies the frame work for academic schedule. It includes number of semesters, working/teaching days, number of subjects papers to be taught, teaching hours per theory paper or practical, semester-end examinations and method of assessment and declaration of results. The detailed syllabus for all the subjects is prescribed by the University.
- ➤ The Internal Examination Committee prepares the schedule for internal examinations (Examination schedule, evaluation schedule, etc). Based on these provisions, teaching, learning and evaluation schedule of the College is planned, organized and informed to the HODs for implementation.
- ➤ The departmental meeting is conducted in which teaching plan for each paper is prepared. Departmental meetings are conducted at regular intervals to discuss the completion of syllabus as per teaching plan.
- Extra periods are taken on holidays and Sundays to complete the syllabus as per academic calendar by respective teachers whose course remains.
- Thus, this systematic approach provides, in advance, the information about teaching, learning and evaluation to all stakeholders. Students get information about the academic programme. At the end of each semester Gondwana University conducts examination and results are declared out.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

- ➤ The measures taken by IQAC in quality enhancement and to improve the teaching —learning process are as follows:
- > To prepare academic calendar.
- ➤ Motivating faculty members periodically to attend Programmes on new and emerging technologies.
- ➤ To analyse the University examination results at the beginning of the academic year and to decide the measures required for improvement of the results.
- ➤ Infrastructure development.

- ➤ To encourage the staff to attend conferences, seminars, workshops, teachers training programmes, so as to get their knowledge updated.
- > To motivate the staff to undertake major and minor research projects.
- ➤ To encourage the students for their involvement in cultural, scientific and social activities.
- ➤ To obtain feedback from the students regarding teaching-learning process as well as infrastructural facilities.
- ➤ To consider the improvements suggested by the students.
- ➤ The IQAC conducts the meeting at regular intervals to achieve the above.

2.3.3 How learning is made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The college has provided the following support structures and systems to develop skills of the teachers

- **1. Interactive learning: -** Students seminars are arranged by teachers, for which all the audio visual aids like Computers, Laptops, LCD-Projectors and other teaching aids are made available to the students by college management.
- **2. Collaborative learning:-** The educational tours, visits to research centres, industrial units and university departments are arranged every year by teachers concerned. The students and the teachers are benefited with this collaborative learning experience. The interaction between employees of these centres and our students and teachers derive proper output.
- **3. Independent learning:-** The B.Sc. II year students undertake project work for Environmental Studies. The students of M.Sc. Sem-IV also undertake project work as a part of their syllabus. The project work is aimed at independent learning by students. The students are encouraged to participate in university level research festival, "Avishkar". The activities like presentation of seminars, completion of home assignments etc. are also helpful in overall development and independent learning skill among the students. The college provides Internet facility to the students. This facilitates independent learning among them.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

➤ The college has provided a good infrastructure to the students. All the Departments have well-equipped laboratories. Books are provided to students during their practical from library.

- The students are motivated and guided for participation in the science exhibitions organized by the university. The students are also encouraged to attend seminar competitions at university level. Field Study tours, industrial visits, visits to research centres are also organized by different departments for the benefit of students.
- ➤ Cultural Association of our college organizes debate and elocution competitions and Annual Gathering. It also motivates the students to participate in University level youth festival. The students are encouraged to write articles for the college magazine "Shabdshilp".
- All these efforts transform the students into life-long learners and innovators.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g.: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.
 - ➤ The college is aware regarding the use of modern teaching aids. Some department in the college have been provided with the facilities like computers, LCD projectors, OHP's etc..
 - The teachers use all these facilities in their teaching-learning programme. Our faculty is now more dependent on e-content freely available on Internet. The faculty members make use of internet for effective teaching learning process.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- ➤ The internet is used by the faculty as well as students for upgradation of knowledge. In addition to this, the recent trends in all subjects are available in journals, periodicals, and newspapers, which are readily available in the central library of the College. The students and faculty have access to this information regularly.
- ➤ College conducts the guest lectures and seminars on the current issues, so as to develop insights into the current issues. It helps the students and faculty to keep pace with the recent developments in various subjects. Besides this, the teachers are motivated and encouraged to attend seminars, conferences, workshops and also deputed to attend orientation and refresher programmes. In this way, the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills.
- > Skills of students are enhanced by performing practicals throughout the year and through industrial visits.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students

Professional Counseling:

- ➤ The college has a Career and Counseling Cell. It guides about job opportunities. It also assists students regarding academics from 2010-15.
- ➤ The College has a NET/SET Cell, which organizes lectures of experts in order to guide the students for preparation for NET and SET examinations.

Academic Advice:

- The students receive academic advice at the time of inaugural functions of the various events. The dignitaries having vast academic aptitude, the authorities from the universities and prominent educationalists from the region are invited to extend academic advice to students. The students are informed about advanced courses, like PG courses in different subjects from time to time. They are also informed about website of higher educational institutes. Alumni students are also invited for interaction.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years. What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
 - ➤ The college encourages the teachers to keep themselves about of the latest development in their respective fields. As technology has emerged in this modern era, it has a revolutionary impact on teaching methods. Our college has been trying to make changes in the use of new technologies for teaching, learning and governance. The faculties of our institution use computers, Laptops, LCD projectors, internet, you tube videos and documentaries regularly. They are assisted with other supporting tools like printers, scanners.
 - ➤ The institution is very keen regarding the use of latest and modern teaching aids. The Principal verify from time to time, the use of ICT by the faculty and give proper suggestions. Students are highly benefitted by these innovative teaching methods. Their interest in learning is increasing day by day. Also they are getting technical knowledge about handling these modern instruments of teaching.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- Our college has well-equipped library having a large collection of books, journals, periodicals and newspapers. The OPAC facility is also available. Students are provided with BT cards for books. The students can easily locate the books on the basis of author, subject and title. Every enrolled student is the member of library. The students are allowed to borrow the books twice in a week. A time table of issue of books is displayed in the library. Each student is allowed to borrow two books at a time. In addition to this, the library provides internet facility to students.
- The library has a reading room for students to make notes and read articles.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes. The college faces many challenges in completing the curriculum within the timeframe.

Challenges:

- Late declaration of results by University, due to certain reasons.
- > Internal examination schedules.
- ➤ Unexpected loss of working days, due to some important challenges like election duty.

Measures adopted to overcome these challenges:

- ➤ Commencement of courses irrespective of results.
- > By arranging extra lectures in zero hours and holidays.
- > The college strictly monitors the schedule so as to minimize the time loss.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- The teaching learning process is monitored by the Principal of the College.
- The quality of teaching and learning is assessed on the basis of the results of individual subjects. At the end of every semester, the results of each subject and every paper are scrutinized and if the results are not satisfactory, it is communicated to the teacher and asked to improve the results next time.
- Sometimes, the principal takes rounds to the classrooms and laboratories to monitor & supervise the process. It yields positive output by the first hand knowledge.
- Principal advice teachers to make improvements of the shortcoming in teaching learning process.
- Student's feedback is taken and suggestion is invited.

Recruitment:

The College is an Govt. aided College. It follows the norms of recruitment of teachers given by University Grants Commission and Government of Maharashtra. The policy of recruitment is:

- The policy of recruitment is transparent.
- During recruitment of staff, the College advertises the vacancies of posts to be filled in some national and state level newspapers
- After getting application from the candidates, these are scrutinized.
- Thereafter, the College demands the selection committee from Gondwana University.
- The selection committee comprises the management members, Principal, Government nominee, Vice-Chancellor's nominee, two subject experts and head of the department of concerned subject.
- The eligible candidates are called for interview.
- The selection committee conducts the interview as per the guidelines of the University and selects the most eligible candidates.

- The selected candidates are given their appointment letter and their approval is then sought from the University as per format.
- Norms regarding eligibility and reservation are strictly followed in recruitment.

Retention:

To retain the appointed staff, the college adopts the following strategy:

- Recruited staff is confirmed as per the UGC regulations.
- The teachers are granted study leaves if they wish to upgrade their qualification by perusing M. Phil. or Ph.D.
- They are allowed to attend orientation and refresher courses.
- Duty leave is sanctioned for attending seminars, conferences and workshops.
- The staff members are encouraged to do the research work by undertaking Major and Minor research projects, for which laboratories and infrastructure are made available as per their requirement.
- Full freedom is granted to initiate the teaching-learning innovations.
- Faculties are encouraged with moral support.

The selection committee takes interview and appoints the qualified candidates based on their performance. Following facilities are provided to them:

• Handling new curriculum & Content Management :-

We have experienced and qualified staff to handle the new curriculum with ease. Whenever, there is change in the syllabus initiated by our university, the same is conveyed to the staff.

The university / college organize workshops on new syllabus. Faculties are encouraged to attend the workshops syllabus. The tools and technologies are purchased as per new syllabus. The syllabus of UGC-Career Oriented Courses is designed by the faculty of the concerned department.

• Selection, development and use of enrichment materials :-

The teachers of our college are given free access to internet. This helps them to collect enrichment materials from the internet. The college has a well developed library which contains books of various subjects and various journals & periodicals.

• Assessment :-

Before the conformation of teacher, the overall assessment of the teacher is discussed in the meeting of Local Management Committee (LMC). The principal also maintains Confidential Report (CR) of all the teachers which records the annual performance of the teachers.

- The college has organized national conference in Botany & Zoology with UGC funding.

Yes, the college gets the evaluation of the teachers done by students. At the end of every academic year students give feedback of individual faculty members based on their teaching skills in the prescribed format. If any faculty or Department doesn't meet the benchmark on feedback, they are counseled by the Principal for improvement in teaching skills and results.

Quality of the teaching – learning process is evaluated by using following criteria:

1. Feedback from student through feedback form.

- 2. Result analysis.
- 3. Oral Feedback from students and parents.
- 4. Online feedback on website.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- The College make aware all the Stakeholders i.e. students ,faculty members and the parents of the students about evaluation process through college prospectus.
- Guidelines about evaluation process given by the university are communicated to the students in the classrooms.
- At the start of the semester, students are informed regarding the pattern of internal as well as semester end examinations and also evaluation system. Students are clearly made aware of the eligibility conditions required to appear in the final examination.
- Internal examinations are conducted as per the schedule. Immediately after the examination, answer sheets are evaluated and assessed answer books are distributed in classroom and students are informed about their mistakes and given suggestions for their better performance.
- Their doubts, are cleared. The mark lists of individual internal examinations as well as consolidated marks of both the examinations are displayed on students" notice board. Practice examination for practical evaluation is also conducted by all the departments.
- A record of University examination result is maintained in the college office. Record of internal assessment is also maintained by the respective department.
- Based on this faculty take appropriate measures to improve the performance of the students.
- The performance of the students in the internal examination is conveyed to their parents
- Management is also very keen about examination results. The results are discussed at the start of each academic year in the meeting.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Evaluation Reforms of University:-

- Internal assessment at college level (Compulsory)
- Theory type examinations for B.Sc. I, II, III and M.Sc. I & II

Evaluation Reforms of College:

The College follows the evaluation method of the University. The college conducts internal examinations for each semester & the marks of internal examinations are sent to university.

• The schedule of both the internal examinations is displayed in advance at the beginning of semester. Internal examinations are conducted and the departments set their own question papers and conduct the examinations.

- The evaluation reforms of the university are followed by the college in which the students are shown their assessed answer sheets. Any doubt about evaluation is made clear to the students and they are satisfied by the evaluation process.
- All record of examination i.e answer sheets, marksheets are maintained in College.
- The students are encouraged and consulted for better performance in the next examinations.

Method of Formative And Summative Evaluation:

- The evaluation reforms of the University are followed by the College. For bringing out some improvement among students, the College adopts formative and summative methods of evaluation.
- In the formative evaluation, internal examinations are conducted. After completion of the internal examinations, marks are consolidated and are sent to university.
- Summative evaluation is carried out by university. For this, the marks of university examination are considered. This evaluation is carried out by the examiners appointed by the Gondwana university.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

Complete transparency is maintained by our college in the internal assessment. The internal assessment is done as per the guidelines of the Gondwana University, Gadchiroli. After preparing the assessment report, it is submitted by the subject teacher to the Principal / HOD of the College. The HOD display the results on the notice board before submitting to the university. The students can log complain, if any. After receiving complain, the papers are reassessed by the subject teacher.

The behavioral aspects, independent learning and communication skills of the students are considered for evaluation during practical examinations.

2.5.6 What is the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

Self-confidence, self-reliance, ethical values, communication skills, team work, problem-solving skills and social responsibilities are some of the graduate attributes specified by the College.

For the attainment of the graduate attributes, all the possible attempts are made by College. The academic calendar is strictly followed. All the teachers make use of ICT to make the complex concepts simple and to create interest about the subject in the students. Students" seminars and group discussions are arranged. The teachers always try to improve the results and enhance the intellectual level of the students. The syllabus is completed in time and revision is taken.

Besides the regular studies, the College organizes many different activities through NCC and NSS which help in overall development of students, Career guidance and counseling, annual gathering and sport activities are also the activities which are given due importance. Study tours, industrial visits and visit to research centres are also arranged. The students are encouraged to participate in the various events. All this help to attain the graduate attributes among the students

• Redressal of grievance at college level:

Complete transparency is maintained in the evaluation process. The doubts of students about evaluation are cleared by the concerned teachers. So, there are no grievances of students with reference to evaluation at the College level.

During last four years, there is no complaint of students regarding internal evaluation.

• Redressal of grievance at University level:

In case of grievance with reference to evaluation at University level, the student has to submit an application to the university along with the prescribed fees within the duration announced by the university. After revaluation, the university communicates the result to the student. A student can also get a Photostat copy of his answer sheet and can ask for the revaluation of the answer sheet. Some of the students have availed this facility.

Every programme has its own learning outcomes set out by university itself as preface to the syllabus. The staff members are therefore well-informed of these outcomes before they commence teaching.

The college aims to help the students to reach their potential through the provision of a supportive environment. Innovative teaching methods,

The college runs five Career Oriented Courses sanctioned by UGC. These courses help to achieve the learning outcomes.

The students are sensitized on the social responsibilities through the NSS and NCC programmes. Apart from teaching they are encouraged to participate in social activities. The college arranges campus interviews of different companies. Industrial visits and educational tours are also organized. The college offers professional courses like B.Sc. (Computer Science) and 5 Career Oriented Courses.

The college guides the students for preparation of the NET and SET examinations. Coaching for competitive examinations like MPSC is also given.

The students are encouraged to participate in "Avishkar" festival organized by Gondwana University, Gadchiroli . The PG students carry out research work as a part of their project. They are also encouraged to participate in various science exhibitions.

The college organizes national level conferences and seminars, which attract the students towards research activity. The department of Zoology, Botany, Physics, Maths has a recognized research centre. Other departments also have research based instruments. Research guides are available in the subject Mathematics, Physics, Botany and Zoology for pursuing Ph. D. degree.

The data on learning outcomes includes

- 1. Providing question bank of different subjects to the students.
- 2. Timely redressal of students" grievances.
- 3. By showing answer books to students to make them identify their relative strengths and weaknesses.

- 4. Counseling of students to minimize absentee.
- 5. Remedial classes for weak students to solve their problems.

The attendance is compulsorily taken in every lecture and practical. The absentee and performance in examination are informed to their parents. Counseling is provided to students who are absent for long time. The weaker students are given remedial coaching. The students are encouraged for participation in various curricular and co-curricular activities inside as well as outside the College. Student's seminars and group discussions are arranged. Students are motivated every time for performing better & better.

Yes, the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. During class teaching, there is face-to-face interaction between students and teachers. In science faculty, all the subjects have practical paper. During practical also, there is face-to-face communication, during which behaviour and subject knowledge of the students are carefully monitored by the teachers. These characteristics are considered for evaluation during practical examinations. The NCC, NSS and Sports students are also given due advantages in assessment as an additional weightage. Similarly, those students who show leadership qualities & interest are offered to join various clubs & to conduct its activities regularly.

Teachers have been striving to upgrade their knowledge continuously as per the needs and changes in curriculum.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

Institutional Mechanisms for Maintenance & Upkeep:-

- 1) For the maintenance and upkeep of infrastructure facilities and equipment of the college budgetary provisions are made.
- 2) For the maintenance and upkeep of infrastructure the institution consults professional architects.
- 3) Renovation and painting of college is done as per need.
- 4) For the proper maintenance of accessories, equipments Services of professionally trained people are used for which charges are paid.
- 5) Continuous electricity supply is maintained by using UPS, inverters and Diesel Generator purchased through UGC XIth plan Grants.
- 6) Head of the Departments periodically make checking of the instruments in their respective laboratories.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

In the beginning of each academic session, each department carries out the precision measures for the equipment depending upon the requirement. If the instrument becomes unserviceable within its service warranty period, it is returned to the supplier for calibration. The general instruments are calibrated by our experienced staff members as and when need arises, by going through manuals provided with new instruments.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken up for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (Voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)

- 1) The college has its own diesel generator set for alternate power source and to ensure uninterrupted power supply when electricity shuts down.
- 2) For the regular water supply, the college has its own borewell. It has enough number of overhead tanks and the distribution network throughout the campus. Our electrical and plumbing technicians see them as and when required.

- 3) For maintaining stabilized and drift free operation a voltage control is achieved through UPS and stabilizers.
- 4) The sensitive instruments are maintained through company trained people annually.
- 5) Care is taken for proper earthing of instruments sockets to avoid shock hazard.
- 6) Nagar Parishad water supply from Bhadrawati Nagar Parishad line is fulfilling the daily demand of drinking water supply to our college.

In case of any health related minor event, the first aid is provided in the college by doctor and in case of emergencies the students are sent to nearby hospital run by the management of our institution having advanced medical care facility.

✓ Organizing Coaching Classes for Competitive Exam

The coaching for competitive exams.like Banking, MPSC/UPSC, is imparted to needy students from time to time. Competitive exam classes of NET/SET exam and also remedial coaching classes are also held for SC/ST/OBC students, free of cost under the UGC XIth plan funding.

✓ Skill Development (Spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

The college organizes Personality Development Programmes which enhance the IQ level and communication skills of the students. The college also invites Guest speakers from the different companies which provides regional and global employment opportunities for the students. Special classes are taken for communication skills taking into consideration the rural background of the students. College organizes computer literacy programmes under Career oriented Courses in

Computer Application sanctioned by UGC under XIth plan regularly to improve the information technology skills of the backward class students.

✓ Support for slow learners

For slow learners, additional academic support is provided by the teachers beyond their class room hours. Institution also conducts remedial coaching classes in different subjects to enhance their competence. Enrichment courses like Personality Development Programmes are also conducted to improve students' personality and motivate them for an innovative and creative mindset.

Taking part in these out-of-the-classroom activities helps students to understand the importance of time management, critical analysis and academic & intellectual competence at national level.

- Major plans are discussed and finalized at management level and academic plans are finalized through local management committee, Principal and all H.O.D's. For this, suggestions and recommendations from various committees are considered during frame working.

Through these committees following practices are finalized:

- Formation of various committees for smooth functioning of the college.
- Preparation of academic calendar.
- Infrastructure development and provision of needed necessary facilities.



Section I:

Introduction:

Nilkanthrao Shinde Science and Arts College, Bhadrawati established in June 1993 spreading over to Two Hectres in the Semi Urban Locality and is affliated to Nagpur University, Maharastra. The Arts college is located in a separate building 100 metres away from the main college. It caters to the educational needs of backward and tribal community it offers both Grantin-aid and Self financing courses to generate its own resources (particularly from the self financing courses). There are two faculties Arts and science with five various Programmes(B.A.,B.Sc, M.A., M.Sc., P.G.D.C.C.A.) in various subjects. In addition to this education institution the management also has established Primary and Junior Colleges for the benefit of student community.

It was established with the objectives of fulfilling the higher educational needs of the backward and Tribal classes in the locality and also to provide them quality education through employment oriented courses. It has to obtain 2 f and 12 B status of recognition from University Grants Commission to make them eligible to receive financial assistance or grants.

The Peer Team Consisting of Dr. C.K. Sharma, Chairperson, Former Vice-Chancellor, A.P.S.University,Rewa(M.P) AND Dr.K.Kumarswamy,Joint Director of Collegiate Education Coimbatore as member Co-ordinator examined all the records available for perusal with care in order to help the institution to increase their capacity building and institutional building. The criterion wise observations are presented in the succeeding pages.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The job-oriented graduate courses in the areas of Microbiology, Bio-chemistry, Diploma and Degree in Computer Science have been introduced in the institution to widen the scope for employability of the graduates passing out from the portals of this educational institution. In addition to this, the post graduate courses in Mahtematics, Physics, Chemistry, Geography, History and Marathi were also introduced in this college to cater to the needs of their own students. Home Economics offered in B.A. degree are mostly taken by women students that indicate that the course has more social relevance by sensitizing the younger generation in the art of home management with the cultural flavour.

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Most of the teacher are employing traditional method of teaching i.e chalk and talk method. But the Modern Technology like the use of Computer and the Educational aids like the use of Audio visual aids are clearly absent in their classroom performance. All the courses are in annual system. The teachers make effective steps to complete their teaching programmes within the time framed.

The Principal of this college has conducted more than ten staff meetings in 2003-2004 to evaluate the class room performance of the teaching faculty. All the regular teacher numbering 10 contributary teachers numbering 24 are actively engaged in the class room interaction with their students. Of course there are good success rates in the department like Chemistry(70%) Mathematice(63%)Botany(60%),Zoology(60%),Physics(58%), Geography(93%),Marathi(93%),English(91%)and History(85%) in the academic year 2002-2003.

The teaching faculty of all departments often Conduct Unit Tests to improve the academic ability of their students. The teacher in Economics and another one in Marathi are the M.Phil Degree holders. The Principal of the College has registered for Ph.D in Nagpur University. He has authored 14 research papers are Published in the National and international journals and eleven research papers are accepted for publication. He is a recepient of Eminent Personalities of 20th Century sponsored by IBRA Publication, Bhuwaneshwar in 2000. He has also attended the Refresher Coures conducted by Amravati University, Amarvati in 2001. He has also attended workshops, seminats and conferences 9 in numbers. The rest of the faculties of Various Departments need inspiration and motivation to undertake research works leading to M.Phil/Ph.D Degree.

Out of 34 Teachers, three teachers are actively engaged in research works. The Management neither encourages nor discourages the staff in their undertaking of the research. The principal and management can encourage the faculty and the students to bring out college magazine every year. Besides, some containing their research performance participation in the commutity service can be brought out annually.

The quality of the institutions academic life is in direct proportion to teachers commitment to research, Consultancy and extension. Most of the teachers stay in the comfort zones like passively in their academic persuits and they should be encouraged and provided opportunities by allowing them to undergo orientation courses, Refresher courses, and research methodology courses. They can be financially assisted to shed down inhibitions in their research and to exhibit their talents.

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As such the institution is lacking totally in the promotion of faculty participation in organization of seminars, workshops in their own institution to provide academic expertise to needy people. Departments like Home Economics, Microbiology, Geography and Computer Science can under take consultancy services in the related fields like Embroidery, Food preservation, Fruit jam preparation (Home Economics) Vermiculture, Environmental related issues like Biodegration of polythene wastes, water analysis (Micro-Biology), field survey resource survey, soil mapping, cropping pattern and crop distribution mapping, local area planning (Geography) in order to provide consultancy service to the society. Microbiology and Biochemistry can establish laboratory for blood grouping and samples examinations in association with local hospitals by charging minimum fee. Like wise the Computer Science Department can establish a good browsing center in this area where these facilities are obviously absent.

Though some P.G departments are visibly with under staff yet they are managing to conduct the course to some extent.

Post-graduate courses offered in Geography, Marathi and History are mostly preferred by the students in comparison with other science subjects. (104 out of 140 in 2003-04).

New courses are started in the college with the permission of the State of Maharastra and the University of Nagpur on completing certain norms and regulations that are in force.

The institution is not involved in the curriculum design of the University, as not a single faculty is a member in the board of studies of any discipline

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

Students are selected for admission through interviews and academic record of performance. The Stake holders are less in number in comparison with Quantum of seats, available for admission. Hence, the policy of admission is first come first served. In addition to it university examinations, monthly unit tests are conducted for assessing students general academic achievements. It is appreciated that many teachers have engaged in the preparation of lesson plan before their actual class room performance. The principal overseas them and

Teaching posts for appointment are created on the basis of workload from various departments for which permission is obtained from Nagpur University. Appointment is made through advertisement and interview after getting No Objection Certificate from Joint Director, Higher Education Nagpur Division and Roaster details from B.C. Cell of the Nagpur University. Contributory teachers are appointed by the management with remuneration of Rs 75 per period according to the need of the management

There are admission committee, cultural and sports committee, library committee students council and alumni committees etc. functioning in the college.

College encourages the students to develop students personalities by conducting various cultural and sports activities.

An associate NCC officer of this college is untrained and 52 students cadets have enrolled in NCC. The weekly parades are conducted for 2 hours each day on Saturday and Sunday. The NCC unit is attached to NCC battalion head quarters Wardha. The cadets are taking part in the celebration of Independence Day and the Republic Day in full uniform. NSS activites are reported and the NSS volunteers involve themselves in the Blood Donation Camps, AIDS awareness programmes and road traffic controlling programmes.

CERTERION IV: INFRRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The library is asbestos roofed and is in adequate to meet the educational needs of students (1012) and teaching (34) and non-teaching staff(29) the students book ratio is 1:1:62 and sixteen journals/magazines are available in the library. The annual budget earmarked for the purchase of books is Rs.1 lakh and the total amount spent on the purchase of library books is Rs. 238.000 till date. the qualified Librarian and two Library Assistants are helping the students in maintaining the library. The old catalogue system is in practice. The librarian is computer trained but the library is not offering digitalized service.

The Science laboratories like Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Microbiology are adequate to run the educational programmes. The availability of 22 microscopes in Botany, 12 in Zoology and 04 in Microbiology are in adequate to train the students. Computer Science Department that offers B.Sc. Degree along with PGDCCA possesses 22 systems to satisfy the academic needs of users. Internet facilities and LAN facilies are available.WEB facilities are obviously absent. With regard to the physical facilities available, the college building needs a thorough whitewash, improvement in the toilet facilities restroom for men and women students sick room for the students of both gender, and cycle stand or separate parking area. The vacant space available in the college can be used for tree planting purpose to tone up appearance of the college with greenery background.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The institution annually spends Rs. 16 lakhs to improve the infra-structural facilities of the college. The allocation of funds is explained in this way: (6.5%) for laboratory, (4%) for Library, (1.5%) for sports and (1.5%) for up keeping the campus. The Physical Education Department is maned by the qualified Physical Director to extend a good supports services in training the students in the games like Kabaddi, Volly Ball, Badminton, Co-Co and Korf ball. Indoor games facilities are not available. It is appreciated that this college player in javaline throw(61metres) game out with flying colour with a first place in the state of Maharastra. The other non-teaching faculty comprising of clerks(5), laboratory assistants(3), lab attendants(10) and peons(5) are individually and jointly extending their helping hands in the daily functioning of the college. Their functions include admission work,day to day correspondence, consolidation of students attendance, maintaining the service registers accounts and periodical auditing. Beside, they prepare enrolment of students for university examination, conduct the university examination, prepare the T.C to the students. They help the students in getting the scholorship in time and the scholarship is being distributed to the students in the form of cheques. 1 04022002 (C)

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CRITERION VI: ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

It is a management college and all the major decision taking capacity is rested with the management committee consisting, Nine members including the President and the Secretary. The Registration number is F-147-C of that society. The official records are freely available to the Principal and office of the principal for smooth running of the college.

The academic needs of the departments are presented to the Principal and he in turn provides the facilities in consultation with the management. The ten teaching faculties and 12 Non-teaching faculties are enjoying the Employees Provident Fund facilities. There are Ten Committees to look into the matters of students redressal mechanisms. They convence periodical meeting to evaluate its function. The guardian committee and the students council committee are combined together to help the students in solving their problems.

The Unit cost of the college is (43,38000/1000) Rs 4338/-. The college management mobilizes their own fund to the tune of Rs. 42 Lakhs (2002-2003) and the government of Maharashatra Supplements with the financial assistance of Rs. 7 Lakhs to provide Scholarships and Concessions to the needy students. Out of total investment on the teachers salary accounts 52% and salary for Non-teaching faculties are 28%, 1.5 % for Library, for Laboratory 1% and 2.5 % Contingency expenses. The Chartered Accountant nominated by the management periodically audits the receipts and payments accounts and this process has been completed till 31.3.2003.

CRITERION VII: HEALTHY PRACTICES

Each Department of this Institution has Bulletin boards and the recent trends of the development in the respective subject is exhibited therein for students use and reference. The teacher of Micro-Biology, Home-Economics Geography and Botany have prepared their own albums containg news paper cuttings relating to their subjects.

The courses in Micro-Biology, Bio-chemistry and Computer applications have been started in this college basing on the needs of market demands. There are large scope for creativities and innovations in which the educators and educands have to concentrate.

- The college can provide expertise in the field of land use planning with the help of the Geography Department.
- The Home Economics and Sociology Departments can form women Empowerment cells to suggest the self – help programmers.

- The Principal and Co- ordinanator of NAAC Committee could have taken extra care in the Preparation SSR with all the details incorporated in it in a presentable form. The management can come forward to appoint a Principal on Permanent basis.
- The Management, Principal and members of teaching faculty are interested in the fulfilling the objectives of this institution by serving for the course of economically week and down tribal people.
- The Principal is enthusiastic in all academic matters and he has conducted more than 10 staff meeting in that academic year (2003-2004)
- The institution has extended good support to promote Sports, NCC and NSS. It has produced outstanding Sportsman with State level recognition in Javaline throw.
- A spacious auditorium (a former Cinema theatre) is available in this
 institution attached with Old Projector to screen documentary films of
 the Government film Division for the benefit of Students.
- The teachers are preparing Notes of lesson to use them for effective teaching.
- The few members of Alumni of this institution has expressed their satisfaction pertaining to the functioning of the college particularly the Science Department.
- Many parents participated in the Parent Meeting have endorsed the view that the teachers are taking parental care in imparting the instructions for the improvement of their wards.

Some parents have agreed to say that the discipline of the college is good and safety for women students are adequate to admit their daughters for the courses offered here.






